It was thanks to Ariel that for several years a coach brought a horde of children and **parents from St. Anne's parish in Wrexham** to Pantasaph. The coach arrived early and had hardly stopped before children were cartwheeling on the grass in sheer delight at the freedom and open space on offer.

Before moving to Wales and settling in Marchwiel, Ariel had been a popular Principal Lecturer at the La Sainte Union College of Higher Education in Southampton, working with Sr. Sheila, whom she loved. It was during those enriching years training teachers that Ariel became a Catholic. She always remained deeply appreciative of her Anglican roots and was particularly proud of her Norwegian sea-faring father, English mother and upbringing in Sunderland.

From her attachment to the Justice and Peace Centre in Wrexham the **local Cytun, Cafod and TCC all benefitted.** Ariel 's response to injustice-whether at home or abroad- was never half-hearted. If Fairtrade brought decent living and working conditions for women on the tea plantations of Sri Lanka, then Ariel would promote Fairtrade fiercely. Campaigning also for the cancellation of unfair debt she organised coaches to Birmingham, Cologne, Genoa and Edinburgh. At heart she was a great, loving Giant of a woman. May her generous soul rest in peace.

Emergency Update



East Africa

Over 13 million people in the region of East Africa are estimated to require emergency relief, and the United Nations has described the situation as the worst drought in the last 60 years. As famine is declared in several regions of Somalia the crises is certainly getting worse.

The poor rains in East Africa have led to failed crops, meaning families are going hungry and the livelihoods of millions of farmers is at risk. The water shortages are also costing many pastoralists of their livestock. These phenomena coupled with the ever rising food prices in the region are leaving millions of families without adequate nutrition and the potential for mass famine across East Africa grows daily.

This need not be the case, as U.N. General secretary Ban Ki-moon stated in September there is reason to believe that these, and future droughts need not lead to famine. There is evidence that projects, such as the CAFOD sponsored projects in Ethiopia which have given communities there the tools with which to cope with drought without allowing it to damage their livelihoods or threatened their communities.

It is your generosity and support that enables us to respond to a crises such as the drought in East Africa with immediate effect. In the short time since we launched our East Africa appeal you have helped us raise over £4.5 million. Your donations have funded such projects as our water project in Borana which provides water to 20,000 and 80,000 animals.

Emergency Update

Asian Floods

Flooding in South and East Asia brought on by heavy monsoon rains has caused fundamental problems throughout the region, killing hundreds and devastating the lives of millions across the regions. In regions that were still recovering from heavy flooding in 2010 the rains have caused further damage and heartbreak to the population, leaving homes damaged or destroyed. The need for food and clean water, as well as safe shelter has drastically increased and the situation is likely to get worse over the coming months as crops and go unpicked due to unsafe conditions, robbing farmers of their livelihoods.



CAFOD has partners in Cambodia, Bangladesh, Thailand and Pakistan who we are working closely with to ease the suffering caused by the flooding and save lives. In Bangladesh our partner Dhaka Ahsania Mission is has provided over 7,000 families with emergency food, clothing and water purification tablets. In Pakistan we have pledged £400,000 in emergency relief to help more than 5,500 families in Sindh province to provide food, shelter and hygiene kits and training as well as water purification tablets.

We are also engaged in providing long term assistance to flood affected areas by providing education and materials to empower people to build up their flood resistance through building cyclone shelters.

Eisteddfod 2011

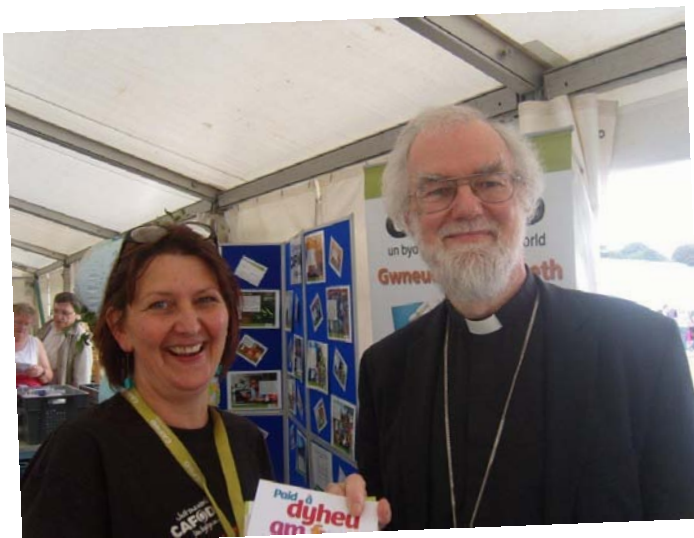
With 200,000 visitors over the 8 days it is one of the most significant events in the Welsh Calendar to celebrate, which we did in style.

SCHOOLCHILDREN learnt about sacred symbols at a Mold exhibition.

As the town of Mold in Flintshire, North Wales, enjoyed its popular food festival at the end of September, **St David's church exhibited treasury of Art and Craft** in the third year of the Sacred Symbols exhibition.



Canon James Webb's beautiful vestment, collected over many years, were exhibited alongside contemporary arts and craft, including the work of sculptors, woodcrafts, artists, marionettes, linked with fantastic creations by the pupils of local primary and secondary schools.

Also on display was the gold chalice presented to the people of Wales by Pope Benedict XVI, and right next to it a Romero Memorial cross and nativity scene painted specially for CAFOD supporters by a artisan painter Lazaro and his family from the little town of La Palma in El Salvador, as well as some samples of Ethiopian crosses .



Pupils then joined workshops in liturgical dance, fabric painting, designing crosses, and embroidery. Over 60 children came up with their own version of the Romero crosses **after having hear of CAFOD's hero and martyr of modern time Oscar Romero.**

On October 1st 2011 CAFOD volunteers from the Wrexham Diocese joined volunteers from over 19 dioceses throughout England and Wales as well as volunteers from Christian Aid and Tearfund as we headed to Manchester for to call upon David Cameron to fulfil his promise of **being :“The Greenest Government Ever!”**

The day began early as the bus left from Glyndwr University, heading for Salford Cathedral for our CAFOD campaign energiser hosted by our much talented campaigns team. Feeling energised and empowered we then headed into Manchester Cathedral to join our friends at Christian Aid and Tearfund for an ecumenical Mass. Once the service was complete the congregation marched upon the streets on Manchester heading to the **site of the Conservative Party Conference to urge our Government: “Not to Drop the Ball Climate Change”.**

The march ended with a moving candlelit vigil in Albert Square. Kevin McCullough, Head of Campaigns, **said:“At times like these we’re reminded of the words of Martin Luther King: ‘Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree.’ Two years ago before the Copenhagen climate talks we marched as a roaring wave. Tonight, we are by our very presence here, planting apple trees and seeds of hope. We’ll be watching for when blue and yellow truly make green”.**

Sunday 23rd October saw our annual Youth retreat to Noddfa, Penmaenmawr. The day was attended by over 20 young volunteers, staff, guardians and CAFOD supporters. It was a great opportunity for young members of the diocese to come together to **learn about CAFOD's work and see how they can get involved.**

We started the day with a prayer and got to know the people in the group a little better. We introduced ourselves by asking questions like: **'Had we ever caught a fish?' the questions were all relating to water.** We had two short PowerPoint presentations and then we got into small groups to answer some multiple choice questions about people in developing countries. We then got a sheet of paper with a little story and the quote from the story that I thought reflected the most was that the little girl was scared of water because it made her sick, because it was dirty.

We then had a lunch of potato soup, ham, gratin followed by chocolate cake made by the residents and sisters at Noddfa. After lunch we watched a little video about water dowsing in Africa, after that the group split into two: we went outside and used the metal sticks with water on the end of them called



sample dowsing. It was a very fun activity to do then we went back inside and started to learn how it worked and to train our minds.

After this we all came in our little groups and made some mind maps about what we can do to help, after this we had a little reflection on the day with prayers being read out by the people in the group it was very quiet and peaceful to think about what we are going to do next.

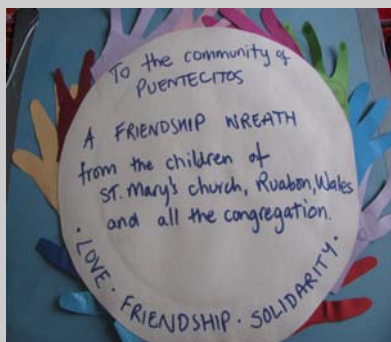

In May of this year, CAFOD in partnership with Eco Congregation launched a new award scheme to give national recognition to Catholic parishes making a difference to their communities. Reflecting on our faith, supporting our brothers and **sisters at home and overseas, and living in tune with God's creation** are all things we aspire to as Catholics.

The Live Simply award is designed to empower congregations to live simply, sustainably with creation and in solidarity with people in poverty. We are calling upon congregations to follow a series of simple steps starting with performing a self assessment of your parish, to implementing a plan to fulfil your pledges.

In October the Wrexham diocese launched the LiveSimply Award with an event in St. Frances of Assisi, in Llay.
